**Facing the Human Tragedy in Syria** (12 minutes): interviews with our sister church in Syria & Lebanon about the war and their humanitarian response along with interviews with PCUSA members and staff on the need for advocacy to find a peaceful solution.

**Locked in a Box: Immigration Detention** (24 mins.) - an award winning short documentary that follows the stories of individuals held in the U.S. Immigration detention system and those who visit them. The film traces the lives of individuals who fled their homelands in search of safety and freedom only to end up in U.S. prisons under a mandatory bed quota system run by Immigration Customs & Enforcement (ICE).

**The Genesis of Exodus: The Roots of Central American Migration (49 mins.)** – interviews with people living in Guatemala and El Salvador about the root causes of recent migration to the U.S. along with interviews with several PCUSA leaders. **Refugee Resettlement** - There are 9 national organizations who work with the US Department of State to coordinate the initial reception of newly resettled refugees with a combined network of almost 300 local offices. **Immediate Refugee (Asylum Seekers) ministry** - First Presbyterian Church of McAllen, TX is hosting volunteer work teams and partnering with the Sacred Heart Welcome Center where “Refugees” (Asylum Seekers) usually arrive in groups. Volunteers are needed to greet and assist persons from Central America and South America brought to the Welcome Center by the US Border Patrol.

- Training is provided
- Adult groups and inter-generational groups are welcome, minimum age for volunteers is 14
- Maximum team size is 15
- Spanish language skills are helpful but not essential
